## WHY?

- ACCESS
- Dozens of copies sitting on the shelf after popularity wanes
- Long holds lists
- Desire to encourage browsing
- Illustrates the depth of our collection



## CHALLENGE #1: COLLECTION RULES

- Pros and cons of holds vs. Quick Picks
- Chose the following collection rules:
  - No renewals
  - No holds
  - Checking out a Quick Pick copy removes you from the holds list
  - Limit of 2 Quick Pick books and 2 Quick Pick DVDs/BluRays at a time
  - Checkout is 1 week, instead of our usual 3





# CHALLENGE #2: TO LEASE OR NOT TO LEASE?



 Researched leasing through B+T and Ingram

- Purchasing was the right fit for our library
  - Cost
- Staff time
- Uses for withdrawn copies




## CHALLENGE #3: FUNDING

- Decided that we needed about \$2500 to get started and build a seed collection
- Funding taken from other fiction budget lines, only impacting one selector
- Support funding from Friends Foundation
  - Budgeted \$6000 for this fiscal year
  - Spent around \$2000 and we are halfway through

- One copy at a time, pub dates, compare to regular collection
- Watch out for surprises!





## SCALABILITY – QUICK PICKS FOR ALL!



- Any size, any budget
- Start with just 2-5 books by the most popular authors at your library
- Always have 1-2 on the shelf



## HAPPY CUSTOMERS, HAPPY STAFF

- Last week a customer drove from Marshalltown for the newest season of Star Trek: Discovery
- Regarding Colson Whitehead's Harlem Shuffle "I was just listening to the author on NPR and I couldn't believe the book was here—it feels like a present to not have to wait!"
- Customers gleefully telling staff what their previous spot in the holds queue was as they walk away with their Quick Pick copy




## MORE HAPPY THAN NOT


- Customer Accounts (Circ) staff say there are "LOTS of people who are shocked to find a new title on the shelf. Lots of people coming in specifically to get [a] new title they saw in the catalog."
- A customer just heard about the collection, and saw there was a copy of *The Rose Code* by Kate Quinn (at that time a 6 week wait on hold). She said she would be back for Quick Picks because "it's a gold mine up here!" She left with 2 Quick Picks and was very pleased.
- Of course, challenges happen too.


